

Celtic Roots and Global Appalachia is a global studies experience that allows students and the community to explore their Celtic Roots, either through travel or semester abroad study in the M.A. dual degree program with the University of West of Scotland. The 2021 Global Appalachia and Celtic Roots course will bring travelers an understanding of Celtic traditions and storytelling associated with the Scottish Highlands and Orkney Islands, in addition to Cumberland's English Lakes and the Yorkshire Moors-all featured in the stories of Robert Burns, Emily Brontë, William and Dorothy Wordsworth, James Boswell, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Bram Stoker, and Appalachian writers Ron Rash and Denise Giardina-with Muriel Spark's The Prime of Miss Jean Brody, Lewis Grassic Gibbon's Sunset Song, and Diana Gabaldon's Outlander spotlighting the prominence of place through film. Travelers will visit World Heritage Sites throughout Britain, traveling to Grasmere, Ayr, Edinburgh, Inverness, Orkney Islands, Haworth, Whitby, and London.

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
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ITINERARY **DAY-BY-DAY DETAILS**

May 11 | Depart from Dulles International Airport for a nonstop flight to London, England

May 12 | A World Strides private coach will meet us at the airport and carry us to Grasmere (village), in England's scenic Lake Country, where we'll stay at the Wordsworth Hotel and Spa. A welcome group dinner will celebrate our arrival, after which we can enjoy an evening stroll through the village and the magic of the Cumberland mountains.

May 13 | It's market day in the village of Keswick, Cumbria. We'll enjoy a boat ride on Derwent Water, where you can get off and on to walk about the Catbells, a favorite of William and Dorothy Wordsworth. Lunch on your own as you explore this bustling English village. Our coach will take us back to Grasmere for afternoon tea at Dove Cottage.

May 14 | We head for Ayr, Scotland, a 2 hour, 45-minute drive from Grasmere, to visit the Robert Burns Center and Museum. Walking the Poet's Path, we'll pass the haunted Abbey ruins, setting for "Tam O'Shanter," and visit the cottage where Burns was born. After, you may explore the center and lunch on your own before the short drive to Edinburgh to our Ibis Hotel, Hunter Square, in Edinburgh's Royal Mile. You are in the center of Scotland's greatest city, and the evening is yours to explore or sip a glass of wine in a pub or café.

May 15 | A leisurely morning walk up the Royal Mile takes us to the charming Lady Stairs Close and the Writers' Museum which celebrates the work of Robert Burns, Sir Walter Scott, and Robert Louis Stevenson. After, you may choose to explore Edinburgh Castle in one direction or the Holyrood Palace in the other on the Royal Mile or visit the Scottish National Museum to see the historic, cultural, and engineering accomplishments of the Scots. A Writer's Tour that leaves from the Writers' Museum will show you the haunts of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, J. K. Rowling, and others who made their home in Edinburgh. You may choose an afternoon's hike and the splendid view of the Firth of Forth from Arthur's Seat looming above the city. Dine at your leisure and enjoy the superb Scottish cuisine.

May 16 | Today coach to Inverness in the Scottish Highlands, a 4-hour journey. After checking into the Penta Hotel Inverness and lunch, we'll meet our local highlander guide to explore the city; then departing from Fort Augustus, we'll enjoy a relaxing tour by water of the gorgeous views of the Scottish highlands from Loch Ness. The evening is ours to explore the city.

May 17 | Today's highlight is a tour of the Orkney Islands. A local guide will join us as we journey to Scotland's archipelago, a WWII outlier setting with Skara Brae and the Ring of Brodgar in our sights, as well as the town of Kirkwall, St. Magnus Cathedral, and Stromness. The Orkneys are at the northern-most end

of Scotland, majestic and hauntingly awe-inspiring. This will be a day taking us far back into ancient Celtic times of prehistory.

May 18 | Today, we immerse ourselves in both the grandness of Scottish history and Shakespearean tragedy, where history and legend merge. The morning finds us on the way to Drummossie Muir, the Battle of Culloden. This definitive battle looms large in Scottish history and in the pages of Diana Gabaldon's Outlander series. Afternoon brings us back to Inverness Castle, one of Scotland's great castles said to have been originally built in the 11th century by Malcolm III, the victor in Macbeth. A tour of the castle concludes our day in Invervess.

May 19 | We leave the Highlands and head south to Whitby, setting for *Dracula*. Our tour object is Whitby Abbey, setting for the 664 Synod of Whitby and one of Henry VIII's 16th-century casualties of the Dissolution. A remarkable event in church history, the synod, called at Hilda's double monastery of Streonshal—later named Whitby Abbey—was the event that determined the Ionian or Celtic Church would follow practices of Rome, including Easter's date. Also from this ruin and the little church below, Dracula launches his invasion of Britain in the Stoker 19th-century novel, a compendium for Victorian fears and class angst and a remarkable example of Gothic fiction. Our coach will drop us at the Abbey Ruin and Museum, and after we'll wend our way down to Whitby's Resolution Hotel, where we rest the night.

May 20 | Departing Whitby, we head for Haworth, where we'll tour the Brontë parsonage at the edge of the Yorkshire Moors, inspiration to the Brontë sisters. After lunch in the village, we're on to London and the St. Giles Hotel, in the Covent Garden/Bloomsbury museum and theater district.

May 21 | Our morning starts with a half-day tour of the city with a local London guide, who will orient us to the London Underground and introduce us to this great city: Trafalgar Square, White Hall, Parliament, Downing Street, St. James Park, and Buckingham Palace. The afternoon we'll be free to "follow your bliss" and experience the international cuisine of London. Perhaps you'll enjoy a concert at St. Martins in the Field or a play in Covent Garden, all near St. Giles Hotel.

May 22 | Explore on your own today, one of the world's great cities and financial capital of Europe. Ride the great Wheel on the Thames, see London Bridge and the famed Tower of London which holds the Crown Jewels, taste some fish-and-chips, ride the Underground to Kew Gardens, take a boat ride down the Thames to Greenwich, or search for the home of Virginia Woolf and her iconoclastic siblings in Bloomsbury near the British Museum. We'll meet later for our final farewell dinner provided by World Strides, savoring the tastes and adventures of this memorable Celtic Roots adventure together.
